Thomas Johnson's commitment to Pittsburgh's youth began in 1993, in some of the city's most economically depressed neighborhoods, with a summer program designed to build basic academic skills. Inspired by the success of the program and the amazing potential of these young people, an assembly of community, individual, and foundation supporters came together in 2001 to launch The Neighborhood Academy (The Academy) as a year-round, extended-day school. Since this beginning, The Neighborhood Academy has grown into a respected educational choice in our community.

The Academy is a non-sectarian, faith-based college preparatory high school for students in grade 8-12 who come from families that demonstrate financial need.


The Academy is dedicated to developing the minds, bodies and spirits of our students so that they become fully productive members of our society.

OUR STUDENT'S SUCCESS

Because of the Neighborhood Academy's unique and holistic approach to education:

- 100% of our graduates are accepted into multiple colleges each.
- 90% have completed college in four years or are currently matriculated.
- 84% of our first three graduating classes are still in school or are working full time.
- The 2012 graduating seniors were accepted into more than 100 4 year colleges and universities.
- This fall our first alumna went off to medical school.

WHO WE SERVE

While the academic backgrounds of our students vary, the vast majority arrive with serious deficits in reading and math skills. Most bring with them to school the challenges of poverty - family histories of abuse and addiction, and daily struggles with basic needs such as food, housing and clothing. A significant number of students require counseling for mental health issues ranging from normal adolescent adjustment to stress caused by abuse, domestic violence or addiction in the family.

Our students come from nearly 20 neighborhoods across Pittsburgh and the surrounding communities, these include: Northside, West End, Hill District, Oakland, East Liberty, Homewood, Garfield, Stanton Heights, Mt. Oliver, Hazelwood, Wilkinsburg, Verona, Penn Hills, Swissvale, North Versailles, Homestead, Braddock, and Duquesne.

OTHER STATISTICS INCLUDE:

- 100% are African-American or biracial
- 69 % have a taxable family income of less than \$20,000
- 50% live in families with a history of drug/alcohol abuse
- 46% live in families with a history of domestic violence
- 18% have an incarcerated parent
- 66% live in a single parent household.
