Letter from The Head of School To: The Neighborhood Academy Community



The moment you cross our school's threshold, you are welcomed by our friendly Administrative Coordinator, Ms. Rosetta Johnson, and The Neighborhood Academy's four pillars: Resilience, Belief, Transcendence, and Ability. Beginning our 22nd

academic year, we welcome 145 students ready to accept the challenge and hold these pillars firmly in their daily lives. These pillars are our 'true north;' a daily reminder that academic excellence, strong faith, and character forge success.

I am happy to announce that we are beginning our school's self-assessment for our 10-year Pennsylvania Association of Independent Schools (PAIS) accreditation. The PAIS accreditation is important to The Neighborhood Academy to keep our establishment rooted in best practices, holding our school to the highest standards of quality, safety, and sustainability. In fall 2023, we will host our first official meeting with members of PAIS, to begin this strategic process. We look forward to keeping you updated on our journey.





University of Pittsburgh Law Professor, David Herring, and seven of his law students, are in their second year of teaching Constitutional Law to our students. Aside from examining the United States Constitution, our students participate in an internal competition where the top four students will travel to Arizona State University School of Law for the Marshall Brennan National Appellate Moot Court Competition. The second component of the course has students working together to define and implement a project in the community related to government and individual rights.

We have begun a mentorship program through Point Park University. Through "Rising Brothers and Sisters," professionals from the University meet with The Neighborhood Academy scholars to discuss topics related to academic, career, and financial success. In addition to these monthly assemblies, students are invited to Point Park for a day to tour the campus. Most importantly, the program will pair high school students with Point Park-based mentors, such as faculty or alumni with experience in the industries that interest them.

Through our cooperative sponsorship with Shady Side Academy in Varsity Football and girls Volleyball, we now offer Middle School football. As a former NCAA collegiate football player, myself, I fully understand that the sport teaches valuable lessons in teamwork that apply both on and off the field. I also realize the importance of never



putting the athlete in before of the student. We have always - and always will - instill in our students the value of a co-curricular education which will transform students into leaders in their families, communities, and nation.

Lastly, I am happy to report that in September, our Board of Directors unanimously approved that The Neighborhood Academy will be opening a Girls Middle School in fall **2023**. The Boys Middle School program has been highly successful since its inception in 2017, and we recognize the benefits of extending our quality holistic education through a separate girls program. Not only will these girls in grades 6-8 be immersed in critical thinking and hands-on learning, but The Neighborhood Academy will be instilling new habits of heart and mind, and ensuring that all issues affecting girls will be addressed.




Nathan is involved in many extracurricular activities such as basketball, track and field, flag football, and cycling, but he has a certain creative outlet that really captures his eye: photography and film.




It's in the bag!

Remembering

Kadiatou "Mama K" Conte Forte

Perhaps it was the exotic mixture of laughter andauthority woven into her accent, or the bright colors she loved to wear, but whatever it was, when Mama Kadiatou walked into the room, the room changed. Graceful and grace-filled, she taught our students how to connect with their African heritage through the drums, the dance, and the choreographed storytelling of their homeland. She taught them discipline and perseverance and the joy of group performance. From her, and from the drumming and dancing so deeply rooted in African culture, our students learned to know themselves in new ways, growing in the confidence so essential to performing on stage...and in life.

Mama taught with that rare combination of demand for excellence and patience that brought out the best in her apprentice dancers as they moved in bare feet or drummed in powerful rhythms. One of my fondest memories was of Mrs. Jodie, responding to Mama's call to the audience, jumping up and trying to imitate the steps that Mama was dancing.

Frank McNutt brought Mama K to us when we were in the old building on Penn Avenue; the sound of the drums and the steps on the creaky floors drove the people who shared the building with us crazy, and there was more than one complaint from the landlord and the tenants. It didn't take long, but they either got used to it or simply gave up and stopped complaining. The reality was that drumming and dance had become part of our school culture, whether performed at Whole Foods, or at our Special Events, or at the Benedum or JCC or Kelly Strayhorn, or at art galleries, or even at our graduation ceremonies at Third Presbyterian Church.

I am not gifted with the artist's sensibility or the artist's special grace; I rely on others to bring that to life, but I know it when I see it, and Mama Kadiatou had

it, shared it, and we, The Neighborhood Academy, were blessed by it. Slowed, and ultimately felled by a stroke,

she has gone home to God; and, as happened so often here on earth, when Mama K danced into heaven, the room changed.

Her memory is a blessing to our school.

Mary Means was heavily into the Mom and grandmother business. When asked about her family, with ever widening eyes and smile, she would tell a detailed story complete with commentary as only a proud mother can. She made sure that her grandchildren were as much of a renaissance woman as she was. I hope that they will be blessed with and live out her caring and warm nerdiness.

The Prophet Isaiah says, "I have called you by name and you are mine." Mary called us, loved us, claimed us. Struck by a stroke, she is now with God. I'm sure there is a discussion about psychology and Aristotle and flowers going on as we speak. We are grateful for her life, the gifts she brought to us, and the way she touched our students. There is a Jewish blessing that says, "May their memory be a blessing." The memories she created here are that blessing.

May God make his face to shine upon her, heal her, and keep her for all the tomorrows to come; indeed, forever more.
