Letter from The Head of School To: The Neighborhood Academy Community

colleges and universities and earned over \$1.1 million in scholarship awards. This outstanding class consisted of young men from our inaugural 7th grade middle school class. Our vision for the Middle School for Boys five years ago is now the vision for our first cohort of girls entering our Middle School for Girls this fall.

In April, TNA's 9th graders hosted a Community Slam at the Boys & Girls Clubs of Western Pennsylvania. 


